SUMMER OF "WILD THINGS"

What a difference a summer makes. As the last of the leaves fall from the trees, we can look back over the past few months and see the big changes that have occurred at the Kerny. In June, the Kerny was pretty much as I and most people familiar with it remember it from years past reasonably wild and fairly empty of people; there for all aware of its secrets to enjoy. By August, it changed to overused and overrun with people; both threatened and threatening with the throngs of strangers. By October, it again changed to be smaller; some of its secrets now locked away for their own protection, yet still exploited by those who seem not to respect its new ways. One can only guess what changes are in store for the Kerny in the coming months.

Blue Mountain Wildlife, whose mission is the preservation and conservation of the wildlife and wetlands along the scenic Schuylkill River in northern Berks and southern Schuylkill Counties, has been struggling to cope with these events. We have a long-range plan in the works that we hope will put the two-hundred and eighty-two acre wilderness in a situation wherein it will be preserved in a

manner intended by BMW and its supporters for the foreseeable future. But while we work to achieve that goal, we must also deal with the many short-term problems that are currently demanding of our resources and imposing upon us their challenges. While we must continue to have clean-ups and repair damage as we have always done, we must also work with State and local agencies to try to find ways that will protect the Kerny for future visitors and keep the Kerny open to all without sacrificing its wildness and serenity. That is the greatest challenge we now face and, recognizing that we may not be able to achieve all of those conditions, we are wrestling with degrees to which we may have to sacrifice one or more of those conditions, and for how long. Finally, we must keep in mind that the land is not ours, that we can only attempt to influence those in control of the land's destiny and that other sensibilities may, in the end, prevail.

Enough of the speechifying. Lest you think the summer was all about trash, read on and discover the good things that also happened at and around the Kerny this summer.

THE SUMMER OF THE "WILD THINGS"

For Blue Mountain Wildlife, the summer of 2016 started off much like most summers before it—the busy spring season coasting to a close while the heat builds and things slow down as the active membership starts to take vacations and enjoy the season. Normally, the BMW activity at the Kerny would settle into an easy rhythm

of trash collection and butterfly garden maintenance, with occasional road work and dragonfly walks to highlight the summer season. The Kerny would see plenty of visitors, but usually the local traffic that the area was accustomed to. traffic The increased would inevitably bring more trash and a small amount of vandalism, challenges that BMW resolve and a small bit of resignation. Though unwelcome, these things have become expected.

With the "Run To The Rock" on June 25th and the Blue Mountain Wildlife 15th Anniversary Open House on the following day, the BMW spring calendar came to a close and BMW was planning to take it easy for a while. The Infor-

mation Kiosk was repaired on July 1st, and Berks County Parks and Recreation held a Starwatch at the Monument Parking Lot on the evening of July 8th. The next event for the Kerny was to be the annual Dragonfly Walk in the Basin on August 13th. Things were supposed to slow down. Unfortunately, that was not to be.

The July 4th weekend (Friday July 1st through Monday the 4th) brought heavy traffic to the Kerny. BMW collected about 27 bags of trash on Tuesday the 5th, mainly from the area

above the Upper Parking Lot and around Pulpit Rock. While much heavier than usual, this was just a taste of what BMW would be in for during the rest of the long, warm and dry summer of 2016.

On July 7th, Nick Savino posted a video to Youtube entitled "WILD THINGS - PEACE

ROCK / Cliff Jumping & Dam Sliding". The video went viral, garnering over 20,000 views in its first two weeks. The following weekend, traffic at Pulpit Rock and The Kerny exploded. As did the amount of trash left behind at the close of the weekend.

traffic increased The again the following weekend, as visitors from New Jersey, New York and even farther started arriving. parking area at the Appalachian Trailhead on Port Clinton Avenue swiftly overflowed and parking spread on to Port Clinton Avenue and along PA Route 61, in spite of the prohibition against on-street parking in that area.

By the weekend of July 23rd and 24th, the problems came to a head.

Crowds were now camping in a number of spots in the Kerny, in spite of the lack of sanitary facilities. Visitors by the hundreds were arriving at Pulpit Rock and the Kerny, beginning on Friday and increasing on Saturday morning. Cars were being parked on Port Clinton Avenue to the Berks County line, and on PA 61 on the shoulders and on the median. Both Tilden and the State Police were present, ticketing and towing vehicles. The parking lots at the Kerny were generally being filled to capacity and many visi-

tors, particularly those from out of the area and relying upon their GPSs to find Pulpit Rock, were often parking on nearby roads and trespassing across private property in an effort to get to Pulpit Rock. And the trash situation was ex-

treme. Although many of the visitors made the effort to take out their trash, they were overshadowed by those who did not. Trash was everywhere strewn throughout the Kerny and across from Pulpit Rock. Volunteers were collecting trash on a daily basis and barely keeping up with the flow. There were many calls on social media, especially Facebook, to remind people to clean up after themselves, and a few people started organizing their own clean-ups to help out. But social media is a

double-edged sword, and the word about the "free waterpark" kept spreading. Vehicles from as far away as New Hampshire, South Carolina, Texas and Colorado were seen in the parking lots.

On Sunday July 24th, Essam Saba, 26, of Allentown, drowned at Pulpit Rock. According to a Channel 69 news report, over 500 people were at Pulpit Rock when the drowning occurred. Word of the drowning spread quickly through social media, with many local residents voicing their anger with the influx of visitors, traffic and trash to the normally quiet area, and many visitors voicing their love for the area and their want to be left alone to have their fun.

On July 29th, a number of the stakeholders in the area, including the Tilden and State Police, Tilden Township, PA DEP and Blue Mountain Wildlife, met at the Tilden Township Municipal Building in a closed meeting to discuss the issues. The meeting had been scheduled earlier, but the recent events had increased community focus on the meeting. After the meeting PA DEP announced that it would be closing its properties on both sides of the river to the public in the near future. No trespassing signs would be posted and enforced.

The announcement seemed to please almost no one and created some confusion as to the extent of the rules. Local runner and Kerny supporter Jim Blandford organized a quick clean-up of Peace Rock Beach on July 31st and his volunteers collected a sizeable amount of trash. But another clean-up, CPR Clean Peace Rock, was cancelled the following weekend due to confusion about the "No Trespassing" rules. crowds continued to arrive, but the word was



ping center and walking along PA 61 to get to Pulpit Rock.


On August 4th. The Game Commission placed large rocks and "No Parking" signs at the Appalachian Trailhead at Port Clinton Avenue. On August 25th, PA DEP posted "No Trespassing" signs at the newly installed gate on Kernsville Dam Road at the Monument Parking Lot. BMW had long planned to install a gate at that location and had authorized the funding of the gate in 2015. As soon as it was installed, it was closed and locked and the new PD DEP signs mounted on it. Similar signs were also installed along Prot Clinton Avenue and on Peace Rock Beach. Since then, Tilden Police have cited over seventy people for defiant trespass.


