THE 2023 ANNUAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING AND BANQUET

For the nineteenth time, the Blue Mountain Wildlife officers, directors and members gathered to review the year past, elect officers and look to the new year ahead. This year's gathering reestablished the traditional meeting place and time—The Loft at C.J. Hummel's in Lenhartsville on the last Friday of January (which happened to be the 27th this year). Over thirty people gathered to renew old friendships and create new ones.

The meeting opened with President Don Wal-

dron welcoming the attendees and leading the introductions. Special Guests included PA State Representative Jamie Barton and his fiancée, Kelly Toyota Manager John Bono and his wife, and Tilden Police Sergeant Pete Witman.

Treasurer Fred Herman gave the financial report, noting that BMW started 2022 with \$13,546 in the bank, took in \$8,168 in revenue, had \$8,580 in expenses and ended 2022 with \$13,134 in the bank.
